

3rd Grade EnglishCurriculum Sample

Each week, students attend a weekly class, either in person or online, and learn a lesson from a teacher. Together, the class completes practice problems to understand the weekly topic.




A Grade Ahead Online Activities





B. Grammar

Verbs

A **verb** shows action in a sentence. In the examples below, the verbs are in bold.



Examples:

We dance every day.

Jill **studied** hard and **got** an A in the math test.

Mom **bought** a toy for Christmas for her baby.

Verbs change their forms to show the time the action occurs. The time of the verb's action is its tense. You must learn to change verbs from one tense to another. 3 basic verb tenses will be covered this week.

Past, Present, and Future Tenses



Teaching Tip: To teach tense, have students write an example of past, present, and future tenses of the same verb. Ask the students how the meaning of the sentences changed.

EX: I jumped I jump I will jump.



Lesson: Grade 3 ENGLISH: Verb & Verb Tenses (W3)

Simple Present Tense Verbs show actions that are happening now or that happen continuously.



Examples:

I play chess.

Joey eats marshmallows. They sing songs together.


Sometimes to form a present tense verb, you will need to add the *suffix* 'es'



Examples:

She watches TV. He catches the ball.

Simple Past Tense Verbs show actions that have already happened.





I played yesterday. You went to the park. He ate lunch with my friend.



Note: To most verbs you can add the 'ed' at the end to make a past tense verb. (jump \rightarrow jumped; reach \rightarrow reached; boil \rightarrow boiled, etc). Sometimes a verb will be irregular and not follow this pattern. The list below will help you with irregular verbs.

Suffix is a letter or

a group of words added to the end of a word to change

its meaning. More

on suffixes will be

covered in week

15.

An irregular verb is a verb that does not follow this general rule to become a past tense verb. Irregular verbs sometimes change a vowel, remove letters, add letters, change completely, or don't change at all. The verbs listed below are just a small sample of the hundreds of irregular verbs in use today.



Examples:

Verbs That Change Form (Irregular Verbs)

arise → arose	awake → awoke	am/are → was/were
begin → began	$bend \to bent$	$blow \rightarrow blew$

Simple Future Tense Verbs show actions that will happen but have not happened yet.



Examples: I will go to the store.

You **will drive** to the beach. They **will ride** the rollercoaster.



Note: You can add **will** or **shall** to the beginning of any verb in the present tense to convert them to the future tense.
